

I'm the first to admit that 6x9 speakers may not be the best option for users seeking ultimate sound quality from their audio gear. They do however, present some undeniably strong design points that have seen them become perhaps the most widely used audio upgrade component on the market. The weightiest of these being that their size and shape allow a pair to fit perfectly into a car's rear parcel shelf.

They also allow two things to happen; their 6x9 inch size endows them with the cone area of an eight-inch woofer, providing some worthwhile bass to be produced; plus they have enough area in the centre to mount one, two or three mids and tweeters to cover the rest of the frequency spectrum.

For this test, we set out to find as many 6x9s under \$300 on the market and pit them against each other in a few different ways. First of all, each speaker was installed as a direct factory replacement in our Honda Accord Euro. It has a pair of OEM Ploneer 6x9s in the rear parcel shelf and as far as factory stereo systems go, the in-dash 6-disc stacker, and front splits with tweeters on the dash make it more than acceptable. We would run the new 6x9s in place as rear fill from the head unit.

The next test would involve a little woodwork. We set out to create a level playing field for as many speakers as we could so we constructed two large speaker boxes, each fitting eight speakers, so we could test eight pairs, one after the other. Each speaker was in a large, one cubic foot enclosure so a good level bass output could be tested.

Wiring up the 16 speakers at a time was a little messy, but was necessary as it enabled fast changes to the amplifier. Firing up some of our favourite sound quality test tracks and a few frequency sweep tones, we set out to measure the speakers' characteristics. Each speaker was scored in each environment and the two figures averaged. Read on for the results.

AXIS CX-694

Axis provided the cheapest speakers on the test, a good \$20 cheaper than the next cheapest; the Megavox's and the Jaycar's. Their sound however, was very average. Muffled and choked treble, weak bass, and poor mid range, they had nothing that impressed. Their appearance wasn't too bad, with the main cone gleaming with a metallic shine, but there is better buying for not manu more dollars.

SONY XS-GT694.7X

Sony's Xplod range are all good looking speakers. Testing their four-way 6x9s, we were not expecting the best sound from them, as it's quite rare for multi-way speakers to perform at the top of the charts. Firing up our test CD, the sound from the Sony's was quite disappointing. The four-ways lacked bass and what treble there was, was rough and inaccurate. They sounded like they were tuned to sound best for FM radio and other poor quality recordings, so it may suit some buyers.

KICKER KS 693

Another US company more known for their subs and amps than their speakers is Kicker. Their three-way KS693's looked to be an interesting speaker. Firing them up we were a little disappointed with the sound. The treble was rough and muffled, it lacked detail and had a poor image. Bass was adequate, but not overly exciting. At this price, we were expecting a little more.

EARTHOUAKE VTEK693

A big bold speaker, featuring a metallic cone, massive magnet and huge mid/tweeter assembly, we expected a big sound from these monsters. What resulted was not exactly big. Comparing them to the other models, the bass was noticeably weak, the mid was flat and the treble too casual. At the top end of the price scale, but nearer to the bottom for sound

CADENCE ZX691

The bright orange Cadence speakers have a noticeably dazzling look, with their chrome mid and tweeter and metallic orange cone. The grilles are equally striking and remain functional. The sound from the ZX691's was mid-field, good bass helped the score a little, but the mids and treble were only just on average. A very high sensitivity rating means they will perform well with the power of a standard head unit.

The Eclipse speaker was one of the best sounding four-ways in the group. With nice mid and accurate treble, it was only the bass performance which let this speaker down a little. It was definitely lacking, but not as bad as the Axis model. They were also the lightest speaker on test, so if you care about weight in your car,

JAYCAR RESPONSE CS-2328

Jaucar's range of two-ways have been popular for a long time. offering good value for money. In testing the current range we were expecting them to perform well and they certainly did that. However, many other speakers near their price point did even better. The titanium tweeters release significant detail, but never sound smooth. The Kevlar cone has a neat appearance but the supplied grilles are typical of the Response brand and make the speaker look cheaper than it is.

KENWOOD KFC-M694.0IE

Kenwood's four-ways are a very similar design to Pioneer's. Both are good looking, modern speakers. We were expecting most of the four-way designs to sound pretty average, however the Kenwood's sound was quite acceptable. A highlight was the bass output, easily matching the better American speakers. Elsewhere the Kenwood's didn't disappoint, but didn't exactly get the feet tapping.

LIGHTNING AUDIO S2.69.2

US brand Lightning Audio put out some awesome products and their cool blue 6x9s are a fine speaker at a good price. With some of the best bass output on test, they were only let down by a slightly weak mid range. Almost as good looking as the Rockford's, the Lightning's are a good alternative to many more popular brands.

CROSSFIRE SX69M

Crossfire's 6x9s are marine speakers, meaning theu can be used on boats and in wet environments. This is actually good for many cars where the sealing is not as good as it could be. Having a sexy, stainless steel basket and all white components, their annearance is attractive, if a little different. If you have a white themed interior, these 6x9s will suit your car perfectly. They performed quite well, with good bass and mids, but the treble was lacking a little refinement. Still, they're a good speaker at a good price.

MTX's 6x9s sound like their subs: big, loud, and typically American.

In this case it's not a bad thing as 6x9s are quite often meant

to sit on the back shelf and pump out tunes as hard as they can. MTX's 6903 do sound decent with massive bass and good mid range and treble. At \$239 they are good value for a good looking and sounding speaker. Their design is a little different with the small

Another good-looking four-way, Pioneer's 6x9s had a quality look and feel to them. Grilles were attractive and the bright blue cone looked the part. Sound-wise there were OK, not offensive in any way. They lacked a little bass compared to some of the others and the mid range was also a little weak, but overall the sound was quite balanced. They also played quite loud thanks to their high sensitivity rating.

JLAudio make some of the world's best subs and their W7 range has been raved about since its release, so we were expecting good performance from the 6x9s. In testing they performed well, with a nice balanced sound not overly strong in any one area, but not poor in any area either. They look like an average speaker with little flash and bling, but perform better than the average. A nice safe sound that will be good with all types of music, the JLs are good buying.

Alpine have one of the best names in car audio. They have a huge

legion of fans, and some of the best gear you can buy. Their speakers in the past have been a little hot and cold, some great

products and some average ones. Their new Type R 6x9s are definitely in the hot category. They have an amazingly detailed top end from their coax tweeter. The bass is a little mild compared

to some models, but good enough for most. A very good looking

speaker, the Alpine scores highly in the appearance stakes.

One of the world's biggest and best-known speaker companies, JBL, rarely make a bad product. Their latest GTO range of speakers perform quite well and are very good value compared to the rest of the American brands. Their 6x9s are a good looking speaker, though the mid/tweeter assembly looks a little cheap with its matte silver finish - but the rest of the speaker is very attractive. They had a good sound to them, a little more laid back than the other US speakers, but with nearly the best bass out of all models tested.

The sound from the Rockford's was very decent, they scored very highlu in treble and bass and did well in the midrange too. A veru forward and bright sound which never seemed to get tiring which is a good thing. Second best behind the Soundstream from the US brands, the RFs are a very good speaker.

Blaupunkt's Velocity 6x9s are a nice speaker. They come with some thick wiring, which comprised the external crossover. Well priced, well built and good-looking, the Blaupunkts are safe buying. Their sound is typical Blaupunkt (a little laid back with the treble not as pronounced as many others), and though it's not overbearing, it is smooth while remaining detailed. This may suit you and your system perfectly, especially if you have any other Blaupunkt speakers in your car as the speakers will sound uniform.

JVC CS-FX6902

A very good-looking speaker; JVC's Kevlar hybrid carbon cone is visually appealing. The titanium central dome tweeter is protected by a crossover, which is built into the wiring and features connectors for both drivers. The simple grilles complete a neat and clean package suitable for most car interiors. The sound from the JVCs was of a high standard; very good treble, if a little bright, but not objectionable. Bass was also very good; it remained tight through the entire range, easily matching most other speakers.

FUSION FES-692

The Fusion offering is excellent value for money. They come in a nice box with their trademark green and black coloured wires (and a sticker), and are a two-way design with a movable central tweeter. The green monsters from NZ are very nice sounding units and they had our review panel tapping their feet to the sweet musical sounds they were producing. With nice balanced sound, even and detailed treble, great bass and good volume, the Fusions did very little wrong.

DLS 960

Well known (in the SQ ranks) Swedish speaker brand DLS have a few models of 6x9s, right up to a \$499 two-way. We tested their \$299 three-way 960. They look very business like but have all the right design features; a silk dome mid range, clear tweeter, foam seal and a 12dB/octave crossover. The sound from the DLS would please many a listener. They have an amazingly smooth-yet-detailed mid-range and very good bass performance. Their treble was accurate, but a little recessed compared to some other models.

MEGAVOX MGX-990 TURBO

The biggest surprise of the test came from little known company Megavox. Reading the box; Power handling 350W RMS. That is about four times the average of the other speakers in the shootout. Listening showed they had a very good sound indeed. The bass was definitely a highlight; tight, detailed, and loud. Feeding each speaker 260 Watts, we were just amazed. They remained clean and clear all the way to 10. They just cranked with no strain. Unbeatable at the price, the Megavox's are the best bang for buck.

SOUNDSTREAM SST6.9

Soundstream's speakers amazed us from the first note they played. In terms of raw sound quality they were head and shoulders above anything else. Silky smooth treble, detailed and even mid range, accurate, tight, deep and loud bass, they did everything right when it came to pumping out tunes. The gloss black cone and swivel tweeter looks simple and classy, while their grilles are definitely noticeable · if you don't mind spiders. When it comes to playing music, the SST6.9's were unbeatable in this test.

ASSESSMENT

What surprised us most about this mega test, was how good some of these speakers actually performed. All of them were significantly better than the OEM pair found in the Accord, so it is definitely worthwhile dropping the odd \$200 on your favourite brand as an upgrade.

Listening to them all in the closed testing room, using quality audio components, highlighted the fact that speaker technology is progressing. Some of these speakers, mounted in a good solid box, would rival similarly priced home hi-fi speakers.

The next biggest surprise, was that their price wasn't the biggest single determining factor on how well they performed. Some mid range and low priced speakers, did sound better to our ears, in our environment, than some of the highest priced models.

Also interesting was that most of the top ten, but not all, were simple, two way designs. While 3 and 4 way designs look more appealing to some, and their power handling is generally higher than most 2 ways, a 3 or 4 way 6x9 speakers audio performance is generally worse than a 2 way.

Of course there are always exceptions to the rules, as the DLS and Megavox (both 3 way designs) show. But what was clear, is that none of the 4 way designs, finished higher than 11th.

It's also worth noting that each brand sent just one model. They may have other versions or different designs still within our set budget, that perform better than the model they sent us for testing. And this test is in no way a reflection of any other equipment in their range.

The Soundstreams really did have the best sound · they were just a sweet speaker that sounded heavenly playing anything at all. Two other brands really stood out: the Fusions, with their well priced and neat looking speakers, sounded very musical and had the listening panel taping their feet, not worrying about how they looked or measured, just that the sound was good; and finally, the Megavox's. It was a shock to see an affordable, average looking speaker, crank out such clean sound at the highest levels in the test, with so much poise and clarity. If it wasn't for the amazing Soundstream's they would have finished first in this test.
